Learning Art In a Park In Rio de Janeiro

RIO DE JANEIRO - Art for art's sake is not the motto of most art schools.

Art for academic credit's sake

At the Escola de Artes Visuais. however, located in Rio's magnificent Parque Laje, the former sentiment is prevalent.

For one thing, the school grants no academic credits of any kind.

"There are no requirements, no age limits, no diplomas," says school director Rubem Breitam, "We are here for people who are interested in developing their artistic abilities."

The school is literally wideopen. "We have students here from age 17 to age 70," says Breitman.

Students pay monthly fees averaging about Cr\$2,500 per course. Courses generally meet two or three times a week. Many are conducted in the open air; others take in the school's Oficina Permanente, i.e., in the many equipment and art materialpacked workshops located mainly in the school's basement.

The range of courses offered at the Escola is ample; and many of the subjects are fascinating. Students can sign up for "foundation courses" such as Sculpture for Beginners, Tapestry Art or Lithography; for more advanced and/or daring would-be artists, there is Puppetry, Interpretation and Liberation Techniques for Actors, and a course called Conceptual Art. For children there is a course called simply Creativity for Children.

The school currently has a total of 400 students and 30 professors.

English Speakers

Two of those professors. Charles Watson and John Nicholson, are native English speakers. Watson is British and

Nicholson American. Watson begins a course in History of Art this month (Cr\$500 registration fee, Cr\$3,000 per month), which will be taught in English He may offer other English language courses later in the year.

Watson is limiting his course to only six students per group. The course will be offered during various time 'schedules. "The course will be primarily audiovisual," he says, "trying to give the students a background in the

history of art." He is particularly interested in up-dating art lovers "on the developments in art during the last 20 years. This is an area where people tend to get left behind." Contemporary art may have to wait for a separate course, however, says Watson, who may also wish to teach on that subject in English.

Some of the school's teachers are employes of the State Education Secretariate, Breitman explains, "but many are active artists. These are the people I like to deal with. It's not sufficient to be simply a good teacher. You have to know your subject. In art you have to be an artist in order to be a good art teacher."

Most professors at the school are actively engaged in various
